- With William Wilberforce, he shares the credit for the act of 1807 which abolished the British slave trade. (first and last name)

- In her explicitly feminist work, "Some Reflections upon Marriage", this 18th-century woman defiantly proclaimed: "A Woman has no mighty Obligations to the Man who makes Love to her; she has no Reason to be fond of being a Wife, or to reckon it a Piece of Preferment when she is taken to be a Man's Upper-Servant; it is no Advantage to her in this World; if rightly managed it may prove one as to the next."
